Aims of the Conference

The second international conference of the Research Network on Military, War and Gender/Diversity (MKGD), founded in March 2024, together with the Bundeswehr Centre for Military History and Social Sciences (ZMSBw) will focus on the themes of masculinities, armed forces and violence in transition. This will enable comparisons to be made across time and regions, as well as exploring continuities and ruptures, and similarities and differences. The regional focus will be on a broadly defined Europe in its global context. The temporal framework will range from the early modern period to the present, including the aftermath and memories of World War II.

 Prof. Dr Aaron Belkin (San Francisco State University)
 Gender Identity and Violence in Authoritarian Times: Reflections on Transgender Military Service

What might the Trump administration's policies banning transgender service members say about how fascist political power operates more broadly? In this keynote address, Belkin argues that the same blind spot that occludes the role that gender typically plays in military socialization complicates efforts to understand how fascist political power consolidates and operates in the US and beyond. In hopes of shining light on this blind spot, he interrogates political and organizational questions concerning military service by transgender Americans as an occasion for telling a story about categorization, binary thinking, and social control in military organizations and in fascist politics.

Aaron Belkin is Professor of Political Sciences at the San Francisco State University and served for 24 years as director of the Palm Center, which the Advocate named as one of America's most effective LGBT rights organizations. Harvard Law Professor Janet Halley said of Belkin that, "Probably no single person deserves more credit for the repeal of 'don't ask, don't tell." His book, *Bring Me Men; Military Masculinity and the Benign Facade of American Empire, 1898-2001*, was published in 2012 by Columbia University Press and picked up by Oxford University Press in 2013.
